

Birds of the ACT

Over 250 species of birds have been recorded in the Australian Capital Territory and its forests, woodlands, rural landscapes, lakes and ponds offer many places to see beautiful and interesting birds. Suburban areas of Canberra with mature planted trees also host a wide variety of birds.

Seasonal changes bring migratory birds to breed in the woodlands and mountain forests, and to congregate in our local wetlands, including the well-known Jerrabomberra Wetlands.

Mulligans Flat is home to woodland species, while beyond the Murrumbidgee River, itself an important corridor for bird movements, are Namadgi National Park and Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve with their own rich birdlife.

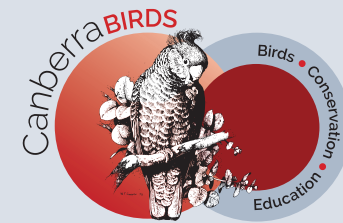
